

# Voluntary Product Accessibility Template

The purpose of the Voluntary Product Accessibility Template is to assist Federal contracting officials in making preliminary assessments regarding the availability of commercial Electronic and Information Technology products and services with features that support accessibility. It is assumed that offerers will provide additional contact information to facilitate more detailed inquiries.

The first table of the Template provides a summary view of the section 508 Standards. The subsequent tables provide more detailed views of each subsection. There are three columns in each table. Column one of the Summary Table describes the subsections of subparts B and C of the Standards. The second column describes the supporting features of the product or refers you to the corresponding detailed table, "e.g., equivalent facilitation." The third column contains any additional remarks and explanations regarding the product. In the subsequent tables, the first column contains the lettered paragraphs of the subsections. The second column describes the supporting features of the product with regard to that paragraph. The third column contains any additional remarks and explanations regarding the product.

<p>(a) When software is designed to run on a system that has a keyboard, product functions shall be executable from a keyboard where the function itself or the result of performing a function can be discerned textually.</p>	<p><b>Supports with Exceptions</b></p>	<p>Customizable keyboard navigation is provided for all menu commands, as well as for selecting and invoking tools, commands, and functions in Premiere CS3</p> <p>Many Dialog boxes are not keyboard accessible.</p> <p>Panels that make use of complex controls and graphics are not keyboard accessible.</p> <p>Selecting items on the timeline requires a mouse.</p>
<p>(b) Applications shall not disrupt or disable activated features of other products that are identified as accessibility features, where those features are developed and documented according to industry standards. Applications also shall not disrupt or disable activated features of any operating system that are identified as accessibility features where the application programming interface for those accessibility features has been documented by the manufacturer of the operating system and is available to the product developer.</p>	<p><b>Supports with Exceptions</b></p>	<p>Premiere CS3 does not support High Contrast mode.</p>

<p>(c) A well-defined on-screen indication of the current focus shall be provided that moves among interactive interface elements as the input focus changes. The focus shall be programmatically exposed so that Assistive Technology can track focus and focus changes.</p>	<p><b>Supports with Exceptions</b></p>	<p>Some elements, such as radio buttons in some dialog boxes and panels do not have a clear indication of focus. Category lists in dialg boxes do not have a clear indication of focus unless the brightness settings are changed.</p>
<p>(d) Sufficient information about a user interface element including the identity, operation and state of the element shall be available to Assistive Technology. When an image represents a program element, the information conveyed by the image must also be available in text.</p>	<p><b>Supports with Exceptions</b></p>	<p>Many controls do not have lables. Text labels are available for all controls on mouse over but not to screen readers or keyboard users.</p>
<p>(e) When bitmap images are used to identify controls, status indicators, or other programmatic elements, the meaning assigned to those images shall be consistent throughout an application's performance.</p>	<p><b>Supports</b></p>	
<p>(f) Textual information shall be provided through operating system functions for displaying text. The minimum information that shall be made available is text content, text input caret location, and text attributes.</p>	<p><b>Supports with Exceptions</b></p>	<p>Textual information is not available in the Title dialog box. Assistive technology can access and edit text but text content and attributes are not available.</p>
<p>(g) Applications shall not override user selected contrast and color selections and other individual display attributes.</p>	<p><b>Supports with Exceptions</b></p>	<p>Premiere CS3 does not support High Contrast Mode.</p>

<p>(h) When animation is displayed, the information shall be displayable in at least one non-animated presentation mode at the option of the user.</p>	<p><b>Not Applicable</b></p>	<p>Premiere CS3 does not use animation in the user interface.</p>
<p>(i) Color coding shall not be used as the only means of conveying information, indicating an action, prompting a response, or distinguishing a visual element.</p>	<p><b>Supports</b></p>	<p>The Premiere CS3 user interface does not use color as the only means of conveying information.</p>
<p>(j) When a product permits a user to adjust color and contrast settings, a variety of color selections capable of producing a range of contrast levels shall be provided.</p>	<p><b>Supports with Exceptions</b></p>	<p>Premiere CS3 allows users to change the contrast settings of the interface, but while there is variety in the brightness settings there is no option to select different color combinations.</p>
<p>(k) Software shall not use flashing or blinking text, objects, or other elements having a flash or blink frequency greater than 2 Hz and lower than 55 Hz.</p>	<p><b>Supports</b></p>	<p>By default, Premiere CS3 does not use flashing or blinking text, objects, or other elements in the software's user interface.</p>
<p>(l) When electronic forms are used, the form shall allow people using Assistive Technology to access the information, field elements, and functionality required for completion and submission of the form, including all directions and cues.</p>	<p><b>Supports with Exceptions</b></p>	<p>Some controls within dialogs within Premiere CS3 do not allow users of assistive technologies to access all information.</p>

<p>a) All analog television displays 13 inches and larger, and computer equipment that includes analog television receiver or display circuitry, shall be equipped with caption decoder circuitry which appropriately receives, decodes, and displays closed captions from broadcast, cable, videotape, and DVD signals. As soon as practicable, but not later than July 1, 2002, widescreen digital television (DTV) displays measuring at least 7.8 inches vertically, DTV sets with conventional displays measuring at least 13 inches vertically, and stand-alone DTV tuners, whether or not they are marketed with display screens, and computer equipment that includes DTV receiver or display circuitry, shall be equipped with caption decoder circuitry which appropriately receives, decodes, and displays closed captions from broadcast, cable, videotape, and DVD signals.</p>	<p><b>Not Applicable</b></p>	<p>Adobe Premiere CS3 does not include any display hardware.</p>
<p>(b) Television tuners, including tuner cards for use in computers, shall be equipped with secondary audio program playback circuitry.</p>	<p><b>Not Applicable</b></p>	<p>Adobe Premiere CS3 does not include any television tuner hardware.</p>
<p>(c) All training and informational video and multimedia productions which support the agency's mission, regardless of format, that contain speech or other audio information necessary for the comprehension of the content, shall be open or closed captioned.</p>	<p><b>Supports</b></p>	<p>Authors exporting video from Premiere CS3 need to supply captions through a separate process, which depends on the destination of the video.</p>

<p>(d) All training and informational video and multimedia productions which support the agency's mission, regardless of format, that contain visual information necessary for the comprehension of the content, shall be audio described.</p>	<p><b>Supports</b></p>	<p>Authors can include an additional audio track for audio description information that will be included as part of the video file, or authors can provide audio description through a separate process.</p>
<p>(e) Display or presentation of alternate text presentation or audio descriptions shall be user-selectable unless permanent.</p>	<p><b>Supports</b></p>	<p>Captions and audio descriptions included in video through Premiere CS3 are "open" and can not be turned on or off, but captions and audio descriptions provided through a separate process (such as adding closed captions or audio descriptions in an Encore CS3 DVD) can be authored to be user-controllable.</p>

There is limited access to dialog boxes using assistive technology.</p>
<p>(b) At least one mode of operation and information retrieval that does not require visual acuity greater than 20/70 shall be provided in audio and enlarged print output working together or independently, or support for Assistive Technology used by people who are visually impaired shall be provided.</p>	<p><b>Supports with Exceptions</b></p>	<p>Some interface elements use small graphics as icons which are not resizable.</p>
<p>(c) At least one mode of operation and information retrieval that does not require user hearing shall be provided, or support for Assistive Technology used by people who are deaf or hard of hearing shall be provided</p>	<p><b>Supports</b></p>	
<p>(d) Where audio information is important for the use of a product, at least one mode of operation and information retrieval shall be provided in an enhanced auditory fashion, or support for assistive hearing devices shall be provided.</p>	<p><b>Supports</b></p>
